

Anjavy Hotel

On the west coast of Madagascar, 150 kilometers north of Majunga, situated on a peninsula overlooking a wide bay lies the luxury retreat of Anjavy. This is a paradise for nature lovers with an exceptional unspoiled location in natural surroundings set on the end of a peninsula over a wide bay. This is virtually the only protected area of deciduous forest between Mahajanga and Nosy Be and contains more than 1800 species of plant, as well as Coquerel's Sifaka, the rare Madagascar fish eagle and chameleons. Anjavy takes its name from the mangrove within its boundaries, "anjavy is the name of a small mangrove shrub.

The resort has 25 air conditioned two storey villas built of rosewood and roofed with satrana leaves. Each has a very large patio overlooking the sea, a living room, breakfast corner and a bedroom, with a king size tub in the bath.

The main complex comprises a bar/restaurant with an exterior and an interior dining room, a swimming pool, five kilometers of beach and a 450-hectare nature reserve. Wildlife viewing here is effortless. Lemurs include the Coquerel's Sifaka, common brown lemurs and mouse lemurs as well as wonderful birds and fascinating reptiles. The area also has an extensive cave system, extensive mangrove forests as well as beaches and coral reefs. The resort has a marina and offers extensive water sports facilities. The beach in front of the villas is for swimming and relaxation. A second beach is geared towards watersports.



Complimentary activities include: catamarans, windsurfing, canoes, snorkeling and aquagym. Diving, water-skiing, parasailing and deep-sea fishing are also available. Boat trips are offered to the Bay of Moromba and the 'Garçonnère des Dieux'; or you can explore the mangroves by pirogue. Land-based sports include: volleyball, table tennis, badminton,



billiards and boules. Mountain bikes are available for a nominal fee. 4WD excursions to the salt lake and a cave with lemur fossils are offered at certain times of year. You can walk through the mangrove at low tide; through the forest, populated by Coquerel's sifakas and a variety of bird species; to the Sakalava fishing villages of Ambondro Ampassy or Anjavy; to the enormous baobab; or explore the numerous small coves.
